## 1 million pounds of green waste collected

The curbside green waste collection surpassed 1 million pounds in a season for the first time.

Since 2010, the program has saved the equivalent of 10,815 cubic yards of airspace in the landfill and offset 659 metric tons of CO<sup>2</sup> that would have been created by the decomposition of the material.

### New Walla Walla Veterans Home is now accepting resident admission applications

The new Walla Walla Veterans Home is now accepting resident applications. The \$34 million facility will serve 80 residents and create 100 permanent jobs in Walla Walla. It will be open in February 2017. To be eligible for admission, applicants must need nursing home care and:

- have served at any time in any branch of the United States Armed Forces:
- have received an honorable discharge;
- reside in Washington;
- be the spouse or widow of an eligible veteran;
- or be a Gold Star Parent.

tive care is also covered by Medicare following a qualifying hospital stay. The Walla Walla Veterans Home also accepts Medicaid, private insurance and private pay.

To help make the Walla Walla Veterans
Home possible, the City Council established
the Walla Walla Veterans Affairs Community
Task Force and lobbied legislators and VA
officials to preserve the Jonathan M. Wainwright Memorial VA Medical Center and earmark millions to improve services. The City
of Walla Walla values veterans and believes
they deserve top-quality care.
