The City of Walla Walla has earned the 2016 Association of Washington Cities WellCity Award. By earning a WellCity Award, the City gets a 2-percent discount on health care premiums, resulting in a total savings of about \$96,000 on health insurance premiums for the City and its employees.

Employee participation in activities and programs that promote good health make this award, and its accompanying cost savings, possible. This will be the third year in a row that the City has earned the award.


Dispatchers Help Citizens During Some of the Worst Moments of Their Lives

Dispatchers deal with citizens' once-ina-lifetime emergencies on a daily basis. The stress levels for Dispatchers are incredibly high, because even a minor error can potentially have severe or deadly consequences.

In Walla Walla County, 911 calls are handled by 12 Dispatchers and three supervisors in Walla Walla Emergency Services Communications (WESCOM). They have guided callers through every kind of situation, from delivering a baby to conducting life-saving CPR. In 2015, they handled about 6,000 medical calls and about 200,000 calls for law enforcement, fires, and inquiries.

City Saves 148 Million Gallons of Water in 2015

The City of Walla Walla achieved a 4-percent reduction in water loss in 2015, thanks in large part to the efforts of Public Works' Water Distribution and Engineering Divisions. Leaks are the No. 1 source of water loss.

A 4-percent reduction may not seem like much, but it equates to 148 million gallons of water. That's enough water to provide water to all of the homes in Dayton and Waitsburg for one year.

Overall, the City has seen a 9.5-percent reduction in water loss since the start of the Infrastructure Repair and Replacement Program in 2010. Since then, the IRRP program has replaced 5.1 miles of the city's leakiest pipes.

Areas of Downtown Lots Blocked Off for Safety

Engineering consultants inspected areas where Mill Creek flows under downtown. They found three areas where the support structures were in poor condition.

The City is responsible for two of the three areas. The first area is in the public parking lot south of Rose Street, across from the Marcus Whitman Hotel and Convention Center. The second area is east of Second Avenue, behind the Trust Cellars tasting rooms. Vehicles are not allowed in these areas.

The third area is on a private parking lot behind the Gardner Building at the corner of Third Avenue and Rose Street. The City recommends that only passenger vehicles park here.

The support structures in the areas across from the Marcus Whitman could be from the 1920s. The support structure in the area near Trust Cellars could date back to the late 1800s.

Fire Inspectors Will Be Conducting Annual Fire and Life Safety Inspections

Fire Inspector Jason Strang and Fire Inspector Tim Thompson of the Walla

Walla Fire Department are conducting more than 1,700 annual fire and life safety inspections for businesses and for residences with three or more living units.

The goal of the Inspectors is to reduce the chance of fires and to increase safety for business owners, property owners, the public, and our firefighters.

There is no charge for the service. Inspectors identify fire and life safety issues and assist business and property owners
